AN ABRASIVE SUBJECT...

This article is a continuation of a series of articles on wood finishing reprinted with permission of Mohawk Finishing Products, Inc.

GRIT NO'S. OR GRADES

In addition to abrasives of varying materials and backings of numerous types, a third description is employed in describing abrasive papers. This identifier would be in relation to the number of abrasive particles per square inch of backing. In the most commonly used form of abrasive papers, this parameter is often identified along with the weight of the paper or cloth backing. For example, 320 A would mean that there are 320 abrasive particles per square inch on this "A" weight backing paper. The higher the number of particles per square inch the smaller the particles are and the smoother sanding properties it has, conversely, the less particles per square inch the larger the abrasive particles are and the rougher the sanding operation will be in appearance. Often times the type of abrasive particle that the paper possesses is not given, or is given in terms of the trade name of the manufacturer. In this case the user must resort to color identification of the abrasive.


