Dear Guild Members.

We just finished a weekend with professional woodworker and SketchUp expert Bob Lang. On Friday evening we had an overview SketchUp seminar with Bob at the newly opened City Hardwoods building. Bob demonstrated the SketchUp drawing process using many of the tools and answering questions from the group.

Saturday and Sunday Bob demonstrated how to build the scaled version of the #700 Stickley Bookcase. He showed us how to build templates to cut the exact width for a dado to match the shelf and a fixture to route the through mortises for the tenons to pass through. And on to the most delicate part of the project, the mitered cross pieces that divide the glass door.

We all had a good time listening to Bob's historical explanation of Stickley and Craftsman Furniture. He was entertaining and showed us many of his techniques for furniture construction.

A special thanks to Steve Stutts for providing delicious meals for the program.

In the next few weeks those members of the class that want to build a #700 bookcase for themselves will be getting together to start the project.

March Pre-Meeting and General Meeting Wrap-up

Despite a bit of rain, the Alabama Woodworker's Guild (AWG) had quite a turn-out for the March 19th meeting. This month's Mentoring Series featured Patrick Bush, our Woodworkers Education Center (WEC) *Shop Manager*. Patrick presented and demonstrated the features of the WEC's 8 inch Grizzly Jointer and the 24 inch Grizzly Planer.





Helpful tips on getting better reference surfaces and creating your own dimensional boards from rough cut planks were news to some and reinforcement to others.





Following the Mentoring Series, the General Meeting got underway with President, Ray Ziegler, providing announcements including the April 9th and 10th Bob Lang Class (a recap of the class will be shared in the May Guild News). Bob had graciously agreed to present a class on the Computer Assisted Design tool: *SketchUp*; which by the time you read this was held in the classroom setting of City Hardwoods (site of our May Meeting). WEC *Facilities Manager*, Frank Higgins, shared with the group the need for a couple or more volunteers to help during the next few months with grass cutting and weed whacking duties. The folks who have performed the duties over the past several years are going to be sidelined this year due to health reasons. We are also looking for volunteers to help patch up some of the navigational obstacles in the driveway (a.k.a. pot holes!).



strate and share some of us customized jigs used to make the individual pieces and final chair design.







The final participant in the Show and Tell was Ed Bullock sharing the Provincial Writing Desk he crafted as part of the Guild's Writing Desk class taught by the Guild's own John Lawson.







March's Program was a true example of the military doctrine of "MARF" (Maintain Absolute Rigid Flexibility). Quick thinking and ever resourceful Vice President Art Chamblee was with the help of several members to demonstrate the usage of some little known WEC Tools: a Work Sharp power sharpening machine, a Porter Cable Pocket Hole Jig, and a box joint table saw sled.

Art demonstrated some of the attachments and sharpening disks available for the Work Sharp. We all know how important it is to have sharp, therefore safe, cutting tools.

Cabinet Mentor Brian Stauss shared the Guild's Porter Cable Pocket Hole Jig was no more difficult to use than it's more recognized Kreg systems. With a bit of practice and attention to detail and care in setup using the WEC's Jig could save you time and some money to use on other tools in your own shop.





Following the classroom portion of the Program and before adjourning to the shop floor, the much anticipated drawing for this month's Door Prize was held with help from WEC Visitor, Madison. This month's prize was a Gift Card to one of the winner's favorite tool and/or material sources.





Back out on the shop floor, Patrick Bush demonstrated one of the lesser known table saw jigs used to make box joints. Tips on saw setup, and safe usage of the jig were valuable in providing alternative joinery options to the woodworker.

After sharing box joints, Patrick tackled the Beast, the Guild's Grizzly 18 inch Dual Drum Sander. Demonstrating careful setup, proper board preparation, and sharing knowledge of how the sander works, what it is and what it is not (it is not to take the place of a Planer!), contributed to dispelling fears of the tool. Proper attention including gradual sanding per pass, can produce a finish ready surface for any project.









The final portion of the Program offered Dwight Hostetter sharing some of his customized jigs used in creating his Windsor Chair. He shared some of his trial and error tactics which led him to develop better tools to help with his projects.


