Over the years our Guild has had a tremendous variety of programs — in the nine years, some 100 programs have been presented — and we believe by introducing our members to many and varied types of woodworking a spark may be generated in some or all of the members. This month you will see how a man, Lane Latham, turned a hobby into a business. Lane makes porch rockers, swings, bar stools and other special pieces from a variety of woods. Mr. Latham lives some

Our April program was one of those we enjoy from time to time where some of our members demonstrate some special tool or talent with us. Ed Nichols brought slides and video tapes to show some things he saw on a recent trip. One was the Warther Museum in Dover, OH. There was this craftsman who started out whittling, but who ended up carving fantastic replicas of trains, specifically railroad engines. He carved them with pocket knives and they were made of elephant tusks (now a NO NO) and the detail work is almost unbelievable. Some of us saw a TV program that toured the museum and Ed, having purchased his slides at the museum captured the aura that attends the work of Mr. Warther. Then, having set up three TV monitors, Ed showed a video tape he made while touring a lumber mill in Scotia, CA. This plant processes redwood from debarking to sized and stacked lumber. They don't waste much at this plant, either. The short

pieces cut off to size long lumber are finger-jointed to make boards suitable for door facings and window facings if they are going to be painted. Most of us have seen some of these boards. After the lumber is kiln-dried it is wrapped in plastic for shipment. A thoroughly interesting trip through this plant and we appreciate Ed sharing these experiences with us.

Ben Landrum, one of our innovative craftsmen demonstrated his veneer press. He related how he had to make three of them before he had one that would stand up under the stress of the pressure he was applying. Now that he has applied angle iron to the pressure bars he has solved that problem. His pressure is applied by tightening 1/4 x 6 (or 8") bolts which are held in place and directed toward the press by metal cross dowels inserted in the pressure bars overhanging the press. He uses his portable drill to tighten the bolts to shorten the time between tightening the first bolt and the last one. He uses a heavy sheet of plastic for the bolts to press against. Ben also showed us some of his jewelry box work, as well as his miter and fence for his router table. Ben, we thank you.

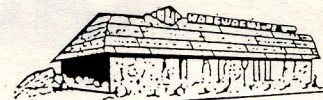

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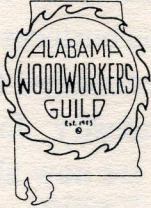
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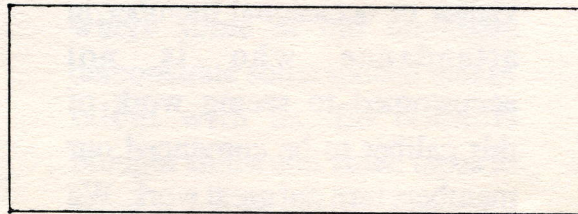
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
