NEXT PROGRAM JULY 13, 1995 • 7:00 PM

Ordinarily we try to give a biography of our program speaker in this space but that is totally unnecessary in the case of our July program. All we need to say is DALE LEWIS and everyone immediately knows this is a member who has produced so many enviable tables, chairs and other objects that challenge our imagination. Dale has the innate ability to create, having been born to create. He has enhanced this ability with art training which he participated in prior to settling on wood as satisfying his need to create. He will take us through the process of creating a piece of furniture beginning with how he conceived the project, how he selected the material, how he matched the wood for the best effect, how he chose the joinery best suited for the project and how he proposes to finish it. We hope he will also tell us how and why he hangs those unusual names on his pieces. Tell your friends and other members to come see and hear.

LAST PROGRAM • JUNE, 1995

One of our members, Jerry Narramore, brought the program at the June meeting. We were pleasantly surprised to learn about a whole new world in wood — DIAMOND WOOD. Jerry learned about this material and upon investigation found he would have to buy the minimum order of \$500 if he wanted to see and feel any of it. First off, it is a plywood but not just ordinary plywood. It consists of 1/16 inch thick layers of birch and beech bonded with phenolic epoxy with the final product being one and a half times the weight of wood. It will ruin the teeth on a band saw quickly and the same for a table saw blade. The manufacturer is very close-mouthed about the process and ultimate uses of the material but Jerry was able to learn two major uses for it are circult boards and trim in expensive cars. It comes in 47 color combinations, and he has had a hard time determining how he can use it. So far he has made gavels, pens/pencils, bud bases and eggs. Jerry demonstrated how it finishes. After the bud vase, say, has been turned, take it to the buffing wheel (which he demonstrated) and start buffing. Miraculously as the vase is turned on the polishing wheel it begins to shine and when finished it was a perfectly beautiful vase that looked like it has been varnished with a gloss finish. A most interesting program, and we appreciate your bringing it to us, Jerry.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING ENTRY BLANK

Exhibit space for your woodwork is preplanned. Therefore, the approximate dimensions in inches of each piece should be listed, as well as whether it should be exhibited on pedestal, floor or wall. Because of the planning involved for accommodating each piece in a designated space in as pleasing a manner as possible, late entries cannot be accepted. It will also be helpful in planning to list the category (Contemporary Furniture, Traditional Furniture, Turnings, Carvings, Small Objects, Toys) of the piece and the level (Intermediate, Advanced) of your work.







