**President's Message** 

As a Guild we have a stated purpose to "promote and administer programs which will benefit the woodworking community and advance the art and craft of woodworking". We have generally fulfilled this purpose through two main pathways, community service and education.

We are well known for our service to the community through our Toy Group which produced over 12,000 toys last year for organizations such as Children's Hospital, Birmingham Ministries, YWCA, and many other hospitals and organizations. Our partnership with Habitat for Humanity permits us to build cabinets for the Holiday House each year. And we have assisted the American Village with special projects like toys, or the reproduction of period furniture like the surgeon's

Now our education deserves a real spotlight too. With guest lecturers like Bob Lang, Jeff Miller, or this year's guest Mike Pekovich, we bring an opportunity to our Guild members to learn a new skill or technique first hand that they would have otherwise missed out on. Our mentors are also highly skilled and have taught dozens of classes the last few years.

But there is one area of education that we need to constantly improve and review, and that is safety. Safety in the shop starts with you the Guild member. You must be trained by a supervisor to use the tools in the WEC, and you need to ask for help when you are not sure of how to operate a piece of equipment. We have added new pieces of equipment in the shop recently, a new drill press, band saw, planer, and 6" joiner have all been added in the past year. Yes, they look a lot like the old ones, but there may be a few differences you have not noticed. Maybe that band saw uses a different size blade, perhaps that drill press has a different depth stop mechanism.

Recently the Board of Directors implemented a new policy that requires retraining if you have been absent from the Guild for more than a year. I hope you will join with me in embracing this new policy as a positive step toward your personal safety and the safety of those working around you.

#### 2019 Annual Dues are due by the end of the Month.

February 28th is fast approaching and now is the time to renew your Alabama Woodworkers Guild annual \$100 membership. So what happens if I do not make the deadline? Well first, your WEC Badge which must be displayed to use the WEC will be removed from wall. Beginning this year, your WEC Training Record and Liability Waiver will be removed from the Binders the supervisors use to confirm your access to use the WEC and equipment. Your Membership in the Facebook Closed Group will be rescinded. Finally, you do not want to let any of the upcoming classes get away from you because you are no longer a "Member in Good Standing".

The Board of Directors has implemented a policy beginning this year whereby if a Member has been away from the Guild for a year or more, Training Recertification and an Updated Liability Waiver will have to be completed. This policy has been put into effect to assure the safety of the members and the protection of the Guild. In other words, if your last Valid Membership Year was 2017 or before, you will need to be recertified and complete a new waiver.

You may join or renew by going to the website (http://wp.awwg.info/about/) and clicking the "Click here to join or renew online now" link to pay via PayPal. You may also bring a check or cash to the WEC and give your dues to the On Duty Supervisor.



While you technically have a "grace" period through the end of February before your membership actually expires, you will not be able to use the WEC or sign up for any classes scheduled after February (i.e. Mark Pekovich's March 9th & 10th Class!). Don't wait to the last minute, get your dues payment off your "To Do" list today!

Marty is a Past-President of the Ottawa Woodworkers Ass'n, a proud recipient of their Danny Proulx Memorial Award and the founding member of the Kingston Wood Artisans Inc. (KWA). He also established the <a href="mailto:kWA Symposium">KWA Symposium</a> and <a href="mailto:kWA Artistry in Wood">kWA Artistry in Wood</a> events, held on alternating years.

## **Shop Notes**



- The large air compressor in the WEC classroom has now had piping run through the shop and classroom. It is available to blowing dust out of the equipment and removing dust from your projects.
- A large TV has been installed in the classroom. This TV and the TV on the cart have been provided to the Guild from a grant from the Alabama State Council on the Arts. They will be used for meetings, classes and demonstrations.
- The various makes of drills and drivers have all been replaced by DeWalt units. Now we will have only 1 type battery and charging station.
- We have determined a location for the 6" jointer and are working on running a power circuit for it.
- All members whose membership has lapsed for more than 1 year will have to sign a new Liability Waiver and will have to go through equipment certification when they renew their membership.





### **Introduction to Carving Class**

Steve Stutts instructed a class on basic carving in two 4 hour sessions in February. I cannot express enough gratitude for Steve's dedication to teaching, his patience, and individual attention, and I'm sure my four classmates would agree. I didn't know what I was in for when I signed up for the class. The main thing I've ever used a chisel for is paring tendons and mortising hinges. At the start of the second class, I was carving a molding, and for my first shot at it, I have to say it is something I wouldn't be embarrassed to show others. Steve focused on fundamentals. Most accomplished woodworkers would agree that mastering fundamentals is indispensable to a good outcome. Steve
