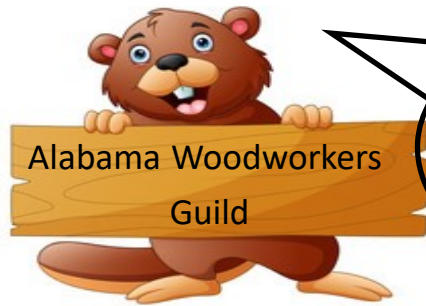

President's Message

I'm pleased to announce we will be starting a Tuesday night "Woodworking Fundamentals Workshop" beginning on Tuesday February 22nd. These will take place from 5-9pm. There will be an instructional topic for each session that will focus on basic instruction. Some nights will be focused on a specific tool like a Table Saw or Band Saw. Others will address techniques such as making box joints or sharpening chisels or milling lumber to size. I hope to have simple project-based nights too where we might make picture frames, boxes, or other small projects.

My plan is to have an open session from 5-6pm for folks to ask general questions and get advice on their own projects. From 6-8pm will be our planned topic. 8-9pm will be for practicing what we learn and clean-up.

What this will **NOT** be is an open shop night. You are welcome to bring your personal projects to the 5-6pm open session if you want to get help addressing problems you are having, but the Workshop will focus exclusively on the night's topic starting at 6pm. This is meant to be a group-oriented activity.

If you are interested in attending, please watch the Guild calendar on our website for the topic of the night. The first session will cover Table Saw usage based on our Saw Stop saws in the shop. We will cover safety, best practices, and cut planning as well as warnings about what to avoid. We will change blades and discuss blade types as well. You will get hands-on experience doing all those things.

If you have topics to request, feel free to send me suggestions at theterryjames@gmail.com And if you'd like to help lead a session, I will welcome your help.

I expect we will repeat some topics several times a year if there is interest enough to do so. There is no fee unless we provide project materials and no sign up required for now. Just come when you can and let's make some saw dust!

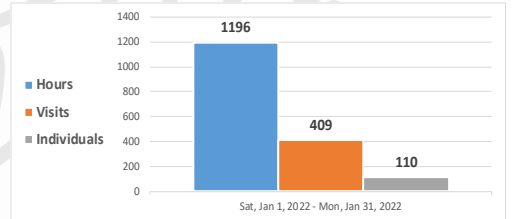
Remember also that we need to have your Badge at the WEC in order for it to be updated with your 2022 Decal.

Partner Challenge

The Partner Challenge is sponsored by the Wood Art Group and opened to all AWG members. This is a tabletop box project. One partner is responsible for constructing the box and the other partner is responsible for embellishing the box. Only traditional woodworking techniques can be used to construct and decorate the box. The box pattern is your choice. You can design your own box, use a magazine /book pattern, or use the patterns Bill Newman has designed for the challenge. The box must be finished and placed in the 2022 AWG Woodworking Show under the "Partner Challenge" category.

Partner Challenge Guidelines

*** Tabletop Box Challenge**

One person is responsible for box construction.

One person is responsible for box embellishment.

*** Traditional woodworking tools on box construction. No CNC router or laser.**

Traditional woodworking tools on box embellishment. No painting.

*** Box must have minimum of 1 drawer.**

*** Minimum size: 6 inches on any side (width or length)**

Maximum size: 16 inches on any side (width or length)

*** Optional: lid and feet. No legs, must sit on a table.**

*** Finished boxes will be submitted in the 2022 AWG woodworking show in a special Partner Challenge category. Each box will be judged according to construction and embellishment.**

That being said, please don't forget about us as you clean out your shop storage and walk by the copier at work. We can always use more wood and boxes. We need the standard copy paper boxed and 1" - 2" pine (2x4's are great).

At February's membership you will get to see the magic that happens turning 2x4's into the toys that bring joy to a lot of children that are hospitalized, undergoing treatment or whose lives have been affected by devastating situations.

HUMANITARIAN OF THE YEAR

Lynn Smith

spent his career as an electrical engineer for Southern Company in Birmingham, Alabama. Now in retirement, he has dedicated his time

to volunteering for various organizations locally and around the world. He worked as the part-time accountant for Hope Manifest, a nonprofit that works with other nonprofits to help the organizations thrive. Because of his commitment to service, Smith is one of Samford's 2021 Humanitarians of the Year.

"One of the nonprofits Hope Manifest was working with at that time was EDGE (now WaterStep), out of Louisville, Kentucky. EDGE trains people from third world countries or people planning on traveling to other countries on health and hygiene, sanitation and hand pump repair. Through this, I was able to participate in WaterStep's hand pump repair class," Smith said.

After completing the class, Smith was asked to visit Haiti following the 2010 earthquake to repair hand pumps. He eventually acquired enough field experience during multiple trips to Haiti that he began teaching the hand pump repair class in Louisville and other countries.

Smith is also involved with

MedWater, another nonprofit that provides training in health and hygiene, sanitation and water purification techniques. He has traveled all over the world, including Uganda, Ecuador and Romania.

Smith is a member of the Alabama Woodworkers Guild and has been building wooden toys for patients for children's hospitals across the Southeast.

Smith said he is "shocked and humbled" to receive the award.

"My name may be on the award, but the accolades belong to all the other people. The others that saw something in me that moved them to invite me to come alongside them to work with them to accomplish things that I could do, but would never have done by myself," Smith said.

The Humanitarian of the Year award is given to Samford graduates of true distinction, wide respect and acknowledged leadership. Nominees are recognized for having given selflessly and working tirelessly to better the lives of others and society at large by staying true to the Samford University mission. ▶
